

It was a wonderful way for our youngest students to showcase their love for the country and to express their creativity while reflecting on what makes Kuwait so special!











The children really enjoyed their science transition lesson with Ms Priya. They had to extract the DNA from a strawberry.


Students also had fun taking part in the STEM challenge, working alongside Year 7 students. They had to design and build a new attraction for a theme park.





Languages and the importance of vocabulary.


During a recent transition from year 6 to 7 event, I had the great fortune of speaking to parents about the importance of English, and language in general.

At KNES, our language departments continue to work as hard as they can to ensure the best in language education.



History – Mr Alan

Kuwait National Day provides us a unique opportunity to explore the subject of history in greater depth. National Day marks the end of a conflict 34 years ago, on 28th February 1991, that ultimately led to the freedom of the Kuwaiti people. However, Kuwait's history goes much further before that, even to the origins of human civilisation itself.

For example, Mesopotamia is known to be the centre of humanity's earliest civilisations that thrived thanks to the nourishing rivers of the Euphrates and Tigris at whose entrance Kuwait is situated. Kuwait was also, for a time, part one of the easternmost regions of the Doman Empire At KNES we therefore have the opportunity to remind ourselves of how learning about recent events such as the Gulf War can allow us to develop a better grasp of history.

This helps us to learn more about who we are and where we come from. And through this we may overcome cultural barriers and create a sense of interconnectedness among the peoples of the world.







As you can see from the images, pupils have been covering a variety of different topics – both distant and recent. One example was about the Spanish Armada's illfated attempt to bring England under its rule in 1588 and progression of its fleet from beginning to the end. Pupils explored what the causes and consequences of such an expedition for the region were and the world beyond it. This doomed voyage help set the stage for what would become the British Empire that would go on to play its own role in Kuwait's history.


In other cases, pupils explored and debated moral problems: namely that of private Harry Farr, a British soldier during World War One who had been accused of desertion and was subsequently executed. They also debated whether his execution could have been justified then. This is especially the case since in more recent times more and more people have acknowledged that he was likely a victim of mental illness, specifically of a condition known then as 'shell shock' which we today would see as a part of PTSD. The hardship and trauma that people went through in those times would resonate with those who were in Kuwait during the war in 1991. During one class, for example, a student shared a story about their father's friend who had been kidnapped by enemy soldiers during the conflict. Fortunately, that man was able to see freedom again. Nevertheless, these cases show us why history is such a powerful and beautiful way for us to learn about who we are, where we come from, and how we relate to others.






Trip to Sadu House, Kuwait

A On February 2, 2025, Year 10 and 11 art students had the opportunity to visit Sadu House in Kuwait, a historic and cultural landmark dedicated to preserving the country's traditional weaving heritage. Originally built in 1936 by Youssef Al Marzouk, the house was later acquired by the National Council for Culture, Arts and Letters in 1980 and transformed into a centre for Sadu weaving—a craft deeply rooted in Kuwait's Bedouin culture.

During the visit, students explored the intricate patterns and techniques of Sadu weaving, gaining insight into the craftsmanship involved in this traditional textile art. They admired the house's architectural elements, which blend Indian decorative influences with traditional Kuwaiti design, and learned about its transformation from a

private residence to a cultural hub.

The visit provided students with inspiration for their own artistic projects, offering a deeper appreciation of Kuwait's rich artistic heritage and the significance of preserving traditional crafts in a modern world. 


